

N.D. HILL WOODEN BUILDING

Common Name: Bread and Roses

224-230 Quincy Street
O.T. Block 43 Lot 8 South

Constructed circa 1870

1870: Nathaniel Hill, who came to Puget Sound in 1852 and claimed 160 acres, purchased the property. He became a prominent citizen and businessman in Port Townsend. The property stayed in the Hill family until the 1920s.

The building was a duplex and used as a dwelling for families.

1939-1951: Tenants were J. Harold and Rose Quigley. Quigley was tour boss and later Superintendent of the National Paper Products Company mill in Port Townsend.

1959-1976: The family of Robert E. Witzdom occupied the building.

1981-82: The building was purchased and remodeled by Tom and Elaine Johnson.

1982: The shingles, which had covered the building for 25 years, were removed and the original siding was exposed . The original wood frame with square nails remains. An old shed was removed, decks added and the interior was converted into a bakery.

The Bread and Roses Bakery opened in 1983. The Courtyard Café currently occupies the building.
